A massive thank you to all who attended the CPR & defibrillator training at Clawton Parish Hall on 15th January.

Training was kindly provided by Jay's Aim and through the event we managed to raise £104.15 which will be passed to Clawton Parish Hall towards upkeep of the defibrillator.

Defibrillator Locations

We are lucky to have 2 defibrillators in Clawton, one on the wall outside the main entrance at Clawton Parish Hall and also one located just outside the main gates at Clawton School.

I believe the one at the hall does not require a code to access, but I am unsure with regards to the one at the school.

I will aim to source more information and update via the Clarion. I will also list our next nearest defibril-

lator locations as we have many people residents who live just outside the village and may be nearer to a neighbouring defibrillator.

Emergency Contact Numbers

During the defibrillator training, some questions were raised. One question in particular was that being a rural community, it's not always possible for those that live further away or on their own, to get to the defibrillator in adequate time. It was suggested to have a section in the Clawton Clarion for Emergency Contact numbers of anyone that lives close to the defibrillators for anyone that has an emergency and needs help from someone nearby.

We all know, being so rural, that at times, it can be a long wait for emergency services to reach us, The idea arose of a list of willing contacts of people who live close to a defibrillator, or anybody local who is able to offer help in an emergency, could be published.

Church Flag

We've been trying to keep a flag flying on the church tower – the Union Jack alternating with St. George's Flag, depending on the time of year.

But it's not been straightforward. High winds at times over the last couple of years have managed to break the flag rope twice – it cost us £700

the first time and £500 the second to have the steeplejacks come and attach a new rope. The challenge is that the enormously heavy flagpole needs to be gently lowered overhanging the tower parapet, then moved back until the pulley at the top is within reach. Then the new rope is inserted and the procedure reversed.

It has apparently been done by volunteers in the past but the consequences of an accident such as the pole toppling onto the church roof or someone being crushed seems to call for outsourcing to experts – in spite of the expense.

The same winds have destroyed at least 4 flags over the last 2 years. Ideally we'd lower it when windy weather is forecast and Steve Bailey kindly tries to do so when especially strong winds are forecast but, being where we are, windy weather is so frequent that it's not really practical to take it down every time winds are forecast, then put it up afterwards. Some flags have not been particularly expensive but ones made specifically to fly from church towers cost £200-£250 each. Hopefully they will last longer than the cheaper ones we've been using.

BUT.... add up the above sums and this is equivalent to a year's collections at church services. And compared with essentials such as electricity, insurance, buildings maintenance and various repairs the flag is probably a lower priority. On the other hand, many people like to see the flag fluttering above the tower.

So we're launching an appeal – for a fund to be set aside specifically for the purchase of flags and maintenance of the flagpole. If you like to see a flag flying over the village we would be very grateful if you would consider making either a one-off or an annual donation. You can do this by using this QR code to go to our Parish Giving webpage, which also asks if you would be prepared to Gift Aid your

donation (so we can reclaim 20% tax) or (if you've kindly chosen an annual donation) whether you would like to increase it annually by the rate of inflation.

As Treasurer, I get a confidential notification of all donations. Unfortunately the Parish Giving system doesn't yet allow you to nominate the fund to which your donation should be allocated, so please could you let me know separately by email or a note if you wish your donation to be used only for the flags and flagpole maintenance. If you'd rather donate by cheque (to St. Leonard's Clawton) or cash we can claim gift aid if you put it in one of the yellow envelopes in the church and place it in the donation box (just write 'Flag Fund' on the envelope). VACANCY

The Parish Council is looking for a Clerk as Sally Whitehead (having completed more than 6 years of sterling service) has given notice that for personal reasons she wishes to resign earlier than originally envisaged.

The job is basically administering the Parish Council, keeping the (fairly simple) accounts, doing their own PAYE and acting as a communication point between the Parish Council and Torridge District Council and Devon County Council, and our local councillors. It is a home-based role involving 20 hours per month paid at the equivalent Civil Service hourly rate. There are 6 Parish Council meetings a year for which the Clerk produces an agenda, attends the meeting and then produces the minutes. A laptop is provided.

EVELYN'S WALK

I didn't organise any walks in December or January so the walk on Monday 12th February was the first walk in 2024.

Seven of us met at Dunsdon Nature Reserve in Pancrasweek & it wasn't raining!!! In fact the sun shone which definitely lifted everyone's spirits. We walked back to the lane from the car park & turned right.



We could admire St. Pancras Church in the distance & enjoy far-reaching views towards Bodmin. At the point where the lane went round a left hand bend, we turned right & then joined the footpath on the right. This is a lovely level walk alongside the Bude Aqueduct, the feeder arm of the Bude Canal. We were effectively walking inland towards Lower Tamar Lake but only walked as far as Puckland Farm. It was a bit sticky under foot but not really muddy which is amazing given how much rain we have had in recent weeks. We looked for spring flowers & spotted a Primrose. We were surprised that we didn't see more especially as it has been so mild. We enjoyed the tranquility along the way. We didn't meet a soul. Apparently, this area is known for Willow Tits & Grasshopper Warblers. We didn't notice any but to be fair, they probably heard our chatter & hid. Once we reached the lane at Puckland Farm, we turned right. It was hard to believe that this is a public road given the lack of tarmac. It was more akin to a track providing access to the farm. When we reached the T-junction, we turned right & the road surface improved.

We continued walking along the lane past Broomhill & by turning right at Dunsdon Cross, we returned to the entrance to the car park. We saw patches of Snowdrops & a Camellia in bloom. The sun continued to shine all the way back. This made a very pleasant circular route of approx. 3.25 miles & a lovely start to the week.

The next walk is planned for Monday 11th March. We'll be setting off from the car park by the Village Hall in Bridgerule at 10am. Everyone is most welcome to join me. If you would like more information, my contact details are:
