Clawton Parish Council News - from Paul Grafton

Thanks once again to Nigel and Edwina Stacey for donating and installing a Christmas Tree at the village crossroads.

Ice and Snow: A reminder that we have access to a snowplough and a gritter trailer with a supply of grit, and the yellow grit bins should be full. A little grit spread with a shovel goes a long way. If you feel we need the gritter (because the ice is severe and likely to last) give me a call on 07794 913757 and, hopefully, I'll get the trailer or arrange for someone to do so.

Visibility: A reminder that if you're walking the lanes please consider wearing something hi-viz. Even in the middle of a dull winter's day there are places where a driver can find it difficult to spot you.

Clarion Distributors

Many thanks once again to our team of distributors who over the past year have delivered a copy of the Clarion every month to those who don't opt to receive it by email.

Application for 9 new-build houses in Clawton.

An architect representing the developer gave the Parish Council a presentation on the proposal, which is a mixture of affordable and market price housing. The Parish Council could see no reason to oppose the development but had several concerns regarding the details as follows:

- The two affordable units built by Mr Dunkin a few years ago (one to buy, one to rent) had not been taken up by anyone locally and indeed had to be offered widely before they were occupied. However, times have changed and there certainly seems to be an unmet demand for rental property in the wider area.
- The offer of 16 parking bays for use by the primary school was much appreciated though it was noted that the planning application to replace the garages opposite the school with 25 parking spaces is currently before the TDC Planning Committee. Were parents to use the bays to pick up and drop off children they would need to cross the road and there is no pavement on the south side and only a very narrow one on the school side. It was felt that DCC Highways would not agree to a pedestrian crossing. A suggestion was made to use the bays for staff parking which would partly avoid this problem. Electric vehicle charging points could be provided.
- The proposed development is on a flood plain but it was noted that works to improve the flow of the River Claw seem to have been effective so far as there have been no recent floods.
- It was noted that there is no public transport in the village.

This piece is being compiled before the Christmas festivities overtake us all. 2021 was not especially a great year to recall for so many people, but we look forward with hope for a better 2022. On behalf of the Parish Hall I wish to express my thanks to all those locals who have supported our efforts to get the community back together again. The Quizzers were almost all from our immediate community, the Bingo brought in others from surrounding villages and the town, after we had ensured the ones in Clawton were guaranteed a table. To top this we had so many crafters and producers from the locality to make two wonderful Saturdays Christmas Fayre days.

Thanks to Jo from Claw Park who kindly donated an electric wheelchair to the hall for anyone to use, the wheelchair was used to help someone in need last week.

Thanks to the band of helpers for updating the kitchen cupboards by removal of old units and replacement pre-used units, kindly donated. The floor will be in need of new vinyl into the New Year. Plans are afoot for the installation of double doors to replace one window on the left hand side of the building to allow more air circulation and to provide an outside seating area for hall users during the better weather!! This is being encouraged by government agencies to combat viruses like Covid. Grants are being obtained to finance this project.

The Committee has obtained a year round alcohol licence for the hall. This will enable events to be held without the need for a three week application to be made to Torridge. The committee will share the annual cost with any approved organisations who require alcohol sales during an event. Starting on Saturday 8th January from 3.30pm we will be opening the hall for any brewery users to meet in the warmth of the hall, we will only be doing this while the brewery is closed. We will gauge how this should be run, we will have supplies of cider, lager, wine and

soft drinks available for sale, and will look towards having a barrel or bottles of Holsworthy Ales beer each week. Bear with us as this is work in progress.

Monthly Walks from Evelyn Sharman

This is the first year that I have arranged a walk in December. Generally, it's such a busy month for everyone & I thought that people would be frantically preparing for Christmas. This year however, I thought that we have missed out on so many things due to COVID that I would organise a walk to try &

make up for those that got cancelled.

We met at Higher Larkworthy Farm on Monday 13th December with very kind permission from the Kirk Family. It is very much a working farm & I am most grateful for their hospitality. We followed the footpath signs that took us through Lower Larkworthy Farm & across the grassy fields. Due to the undulating terrain, it was somewhat difficult to work out the route but someone has very cleverly painted a fence post orange which caught our attention. We used the wooden bridge to cross the stream & then walked up hill through the trees. In previous years, this part has always been a bit slippery underfoot



but actually it wasn't too bad. Several people were intrigued where we were going to emerge as it's very easy to lose all sense of direction. We actually joined the lane at Henford & by turning left, we headed towards the village of Ashwater. This involved a particularly steep up hill climb but we enjoyed beautiful rural views along the way. As we approached the brow, we were watched with interest by three horses in the field on the left. They probably heard us before they saw us! We ventured left along a track. It's not a public footpath but the Kirk family had kindly given us permission to return to our cars that way. We admired some very attractive lichen on the trees by the stream. Apparently, this is a good indication of the quality of the air.
