### HOLSWORTHY WALK AND TALK

We began last month's schedule of walks at Torrington Commons with a total of 38 walkers from both Level 2 and Level 3 setting off together. The walk begins by heading down through woodland following an old Roman road and then onto Common land from which can be seen Torrington Station. We paused here for a photo opportunity before Level 2 diverged onto the Tarka Trail for a circular route back to the starting point with Level 3 heading off to follow the route of the Rolle Canal, before meeting the Tarka Trail



for their return. Water levels in the River Torridge on that day were not very high but if we had gone the following week following heavy rain the Weir would have been quite spectacular to see and to hear as the roaring waters can be heard quite a way before reaching the bridge by the Weir.

The following week took Level 2 walkers to Roadford Lake. Despite checking the route a few days prior to the walk we arrived to find that forestry work was in progress and our usual route was fenced off. Fortunately there are several paths by the lake, the first of which took us to the Diamond Jubilee Sundial. The sculpture was fabricated from a concept by the Sculptor Ben Jones and represents the six decades of HM Queen Elizabeth II's reign, surrounded by granite time pieces taken from the site of the reservoir prior to it being flooded.

If you would like to join us on any of our walks to visit local places, meet new people and enjoy the benefits of walking our current programme of walks is available. Walks start at 10.30 and are **FREE**. Membership forms are available from our Volunteer Walk Leaders prior to the start of the walk.

### **GRIT BAGS**

These are now placed on the hills which aren't covered by the County Council gritting trucks. Please don't move them – if you need some for a specific reason give Paul Grafton a call (07794 913757) as I have a small stock.

If you do need to use some due to icy conditions, be aware that a small amount is surprisingly effective - use about one tablespoon of grit (or a handful) per square meter, spread evenly.

A 20kg bag is enough for around 400 square meters of pavement. Apply sparingly, as excess grit doesn't speed up melting and needs to be mixed with moisture to be effective.


