HOLSWORTHY WALK AND TALK BY GILLIAN ASTON

A very warm Friday morning last month found both Level 2 and Level 3 walkers meeting at Kilkhampton Football Club. A total of 39 walkers set off alongside the A39 main road to Kilkhampton Church, which is dedicated to St James the Great and has many Norman features, although some parts of the Church are thought to date back 1000 years — the south doorway is the only Norman part now remaining. It was substantially rebuilt by the Granville family in the late 15th century. The tower, which is 90 feet high, houses a peel of 8 bells and was completed in 1948 in thankfulness for victory in WWII.



We walked through the well-kept Churchyard and took West Street, towards Kilkhampton Common where the Level 2 walkers continued their walk. Level 3 walkers carried on a short way and took a route through a field leading to the remains of a 'motte and bailey' type castle, thought to date back to Norman times with excavations dating it to mid-12th century. The castle had two wooden towers rather than just one, which was the usual and which would indicate that the castle would have been of strategic importance at the time, probably due to its location on a trade route.

Our Monday Level 1 Walk in the Park had 20 participants one week in August. With Stanhope Park hav-



ing several seats along the circuit around the Park, it is ideal for those who only wish or feel able to walk a short distance, take a rest and then either carry on to the next seat, complete the circuit or head back to the Youth Centre for coffee and biscuits. It is an ideal opportunity for anyone wanting to resume activity following injury or illness or indeed formerly active people looking for the opportunity to socialise in a friendly, supportive environment.

If you would like to join us, we walk on Mondays and Fridays. All walks start at 10.30 am and are **FREE**. Membership forms are available from our Volunteer Walk Leaders prior to the start of the walk.



EVELYN'S WALK

On Monday 11th August, we parked at the Village Hall in Bratton Clovelly. We followed Irene who had kindly agreed to lead the way. We set off down the hill & turned right opposite the Clovelly Inn. We then turned left along the lane which



took us down a very steep hill. We stopped at the bottom where the road crosses a stream to admire what would have been the original Mill on one side & The Manor on the other. Apparently, The Manor dates back to the end of the 18th century. The former stables & barns have been beautifully converted into guest accommodation. We set off up the hill which thankfully wasn't quite as steep as the hill that we had descended. I had wondered about walking the route in the opposite direction BUT we all agreed for future reference that it wasn't a good idea!! We turned left onto a bridleway which is also the access for Manor Cottages & Lower Voaden. The route took us through the farm yard & having bore left, we joined a footpath on our left rather than continue to follow the bridleway. We were reminded by Irene that this was the original packhorse trail & she brought one of the wooden plaques to our attention. It's a beautiful tranquil route & very accessible with self-closing galvanised gates & a wooden footbridge across a stream. No stiles. When we rejoined the lane, we turned left which brought us back to the centre of the village. Some headed for welcome refreshment at Clovelly Inn which looked very inviting & others headed for the cool of the Parish Church of St. Mary the Virgin. It dates back to medieval times &

has some fascinating features including faded wall paintings from the 17th century. I would recommend looking at the web site for Bratton Clovelly prior to making a visit. The circular route was approx. 2.75 miles & took less than two hours.

The next walk will be on Monday 8th September.
